

"The Ha-ba-ne-ra"

Ignacio Cervantes (1847 - 1905) was a renowned Cuban pianist and composer, celebrated in Cuba and Latin America but relatively unknown in the United States. He is best known for blending Creole and Cuban musical influences, creating a unique style. Cervantes composed a variety of works, including piano pieces, a symphony, operettas, an opera, and chamber music.

One of his notable contributions is the Cuban danza, a dance form expressed through music. Typically in a symmetrical binary form, these dances are characterized by two strains of 16 measures, often with repeated sections and syncopation. Cervantes' famous danza, *Invitacion*, is recognized for its shift from a brooding e-minor to an optimistic E-major. Another piece, *No llores mas*, depicts a domestic scene with a crying child comforted by a mother, showcasing Cervantes' expressive style.

Invitacion has a repeated rhythm based on the habanera. The syncopated rhythm is **short**, **long**, **short**, **long**, **long**. You can say the syllables of "the ha-ba-ner-a" in rhythm, or tap. See the chart on the next page to understand how the rhythm repeats throughout the parts of the music.

This music was originally written for solo piano. Classics 4 Kids will play an arrangement for orchestra.

Danzón No. 2, composed by Arturo Márquez, is a popular contemporary Mexican classical piece for orchestra.

The piece gained global acclaim when performed by the Simón Bolívar Youth Orchestra of Venezuela during their 2007 European and American tour under Gustavo Dudamel.

Commissioned by the National Autonomous University of Mexico, Danzón No. 2 premiered in 1994 in Mexico City. Written for a full orchestra, it features solos for various instruments

The composition reflects the danzón dance style rooted in Cuban origins and vital to the folklore of the Mexican state of Veracruz. The music draws rhythmic interest from varied accents and tempos. Marquez' music was inspired by ballroom dancers from Veracruz.

The piece starts with a special repeated rhythm by the clave percussion instrument. The rhythm is counted in two slower beats, and then three faster beats.

Dance the Salsa

A special type of Latin American dance and music is called the *salsa*. Salsa music borrows much from the Cuban music genre of *son*. Through the musicians' use of percussion instruments such as the clave, maracas, conga, bongo, cowbell, and others—the instruments and the singers often mimic the call-and-response patterns of traditional African songs and then break into the chorus.

Salsa dance is a type of dance that is used to accompany salsa music.

Basic salsa dance steps:

- 1. Start with your feet together. Step forward with your right foot, rock back on your left foot, and then bring your right foot back together with your left foot (on counts 1 & 2).
- 2. Step back with your left foot, rock forward on your right foot, and then bring your left foot back with your right foot (on counts 3 & 4).
- 3. Step to the side with your right foot, step in place with your left foot, then bring your right foot back to the center (on counts 5 & 6).
- 4. Step to the side with your left foot. Step in place with your right foot, then bring your left foot back to the center (on counts 7 and 8).





Cuban Music Stars

Celia Cruz (1925-2003), a Cuban American singer, captivated audiences with her soulful voice and rhythmic style. Recognized as the "Queen of Salsa," she became a symbol of the genre, blending Afro-Cuban and Caribbean influences in her music.

Gloria Estefan, born on September 1, 1957, is a Cuban-American singer, actress, and businesswoman. With eight Grammy Awards and a Presidential Medal of Freedom, she is acclaimed as one of the Top 100 greatest artists by VH1 and Billboard. Estefan's record sales exceed 100 million worldwide, making her one of the best-selling female singers. Her hits, like "Conga," "1-2-3," "Don't Wanna Lose You," and "Rhythm Is Gonna Get You," topped international charts. Credited with breaking barriers for Latin musicians, Estefan opened doors for artists such as Selena, Jon Secada, Shakira, and Ricky Martin.





Established in 2019, Sabrosas Latin Orchestra, a 501(c)(3) organization, is proud to be the first all-female salsa band in San Diego. The talented musicians of Sabrosas infuse high energy into a variety of Latin styles including salsa, cumbia, and cha cha. Sabrosas Latin Orchestra has performed at the Belly Up, Rock N Roll Marathon, NAMM, the Carlsbad TGIF Concerts In the Park Series, live on KUSI and CBS 8, and on the stages of numerous festivals.

Sabrosas Latin Orchestra seeks to bring the joy of music and dance to people of all ages and backgrounds and to encourage women to grow their talents in music for generations to come.







Juan Carlos Blanco was born and raised in Havana, Cuba, where he performed with several professional companies for over 15 years before coming to the U.S. In his youth, he began his performance career with the folkloric arts groups Cumballe and Oba Ilú in his hometown of Guanabacoa, a community of Havana known for its rich Afro-Cuban cultural traditions. He later joined one of Cuba's most renowned folkloric companies, Raices Profundas (Deep Roots), soon becoming lead male dancer and soloist and touring Latin America and Asia.

Juan Carlos Blanco is the Artistic Director for Omo Aché Cuban Cultural Arts. Classics 4 Kids welcomes Juan Carlos and Omo Aché dancers to our concerts.
